ENGLISH 4513— Introduction to Medieval Literature

Description: Introduction to Medieval Literature. The study of masterpieces from the Middle Ages, chosen for their values in interpreting medieval culture as well as for their independent literary worth. This course introduces students to major genres of medieval European literature written over the span of a millennium and situates those works of literature within their diverse historical and intellectual contexts.

Building upon selections from classical Rome and early Christianity, we will explore the medieval literature of feud and warfare, romance, monastic and scholastic learning, and popular religion and mysticism.

This is a literary history class, so in addition to wrestling with the ideas conveyed by the readings, students will be accountable for learning when, where, and in what languages and genres our readings were composed. We will also devote time to dismantling "presentist" misconceptions about the Middle Ages, particularly those that oversimplify pliable categories such as "hero" and "feminist."

Major assignments (research papers and in-class presentation) will emphasize research skills and the integration of multiple primary and secondary sources into literary-historical analysis.

This particular section of Introduction to Shakespeare will be experimenting with cutting edge techniques for facilitating embodied learning through the combination of rehearsal room techniques modeled on professional theater companies with close textual analysis of Shakespeare's language. Our in-depth exploration will include selected comedies and tragedies, not to mention a lot of fun along the way.

HISTORY 3247 – Magic & Witchcraft

Description: Magic has been with us since the dawn of human consciousness and it is with us still. Understanding magical mentalities is therefore an important historical project but also a difficult one. The early modern period, 1450-1750—the period of the European witch hunts—offers an ideal setting in which to study magical thinking and related matters. We will learn why the tumultuous events of this period created a highly fertile and dynamic atmosphere for magic and witchcraft beliefs. We will learn quite a bit about this period in European history generally. We will examine the distinctions between learned and lay magic; "white" and "black" magic; and different types of magical practice. We will pay particular attention to witches, witch hunts, and shifting ideas about witchcraft on the eve of the Enlightenment. A second and more practical focus of the course will be on identifying the thesis of a chapter, article or book and on recognizing the main arguments or proofs marshaled to support that thesis. A third focus will be on the close analysis of primary documents.

<u>HISTART 8401 - VISUAL CULTURES OF MONASTICISM IN MEDIEVAL AND</u> RENAISSANCE EUROPE

Description: Within the Indo-European family, the Germanic and Slavic branches occupy interesting positions relative to one another. A comparison of the two branches reveals significant differences between them in all areas of grammar. At the same time, however, there are some striking parallels that suggest a relationship of some sort between them, whether due to shared origin (genealogical), due to shared patterns of human language (typological), or, recognizing that these branches were most likely positioned close to one another prehistorically for centuries, and have certainly been so during the historical period, due to contact between the two groups. A further complicating issue is the question of where the Baltic languages (e.g. Lithuanian, etc.) fit in, as they too show significant similarities and differences with both Germanic and Slavic. In this course, we explore all of these interrelationships, examining the phonology, morphology, and syntax of these branches on a comparative basis, looking at both the relevant diachronic developments and the relevant synchronic structures. We develop a picture of Proto-(Balto-)Slavic and Proto-Germanic, and look at the ways in which the various attested languages as synchronic systems have emerged out of the proto-languages and what the theoretical significance is of these systems.

No previous knowledge of Slavic languages or Germanic languages (other than English!) is required, though obviously such knowledge is helpful, and essential linguistic concepts will be introduced as needed. This course is open to all interested parties, whether undergraduate or graduate, whether student of some Slavic language or Germanic language or neither, whether linguist or nonlinguist; you must, however, come with an open mind regarding learning about new languages, cultures, and methods for investigating the past.

Notes regarding enrolling for the class:

- 1. This is a jointly taught class but it has two different Master Schedule listings, one in Linguistics (listed as Linguistics 7903) taught by Björn Köhnlein and one in Slavic (listed as East European Languages and Literatures 5627) taught by Brian Joseph. The reality is that both classes will meet at the same time and Professors Köhnlein and Joseph will jointly provide the course material, as in a co-taught class.
- 2. The plan is for Linguistics graduate students to sign up for the Ling 7903 and for Slavic graduate students and all undergraduates (in Linguistics or Slavic or wherever) to sign up for the EEurLL 5627. Graduate students in other departments can sign up for either course.
- 3. Linguistics graduate students signing up for Ling 7903 may be told that they need to have Ling 7902 as a prerequisite; if you have not taken 7902, do not despair -- we are waiving that prerequisite, but you may need to petition Professor Köhnlein (via e-mail) to have the prerequisite waived.
